James G. Breckenridge, Ph.D. Former Provost for the U.S. Army War College, Beirut Veteran

As an Army Captain Dr. Jim Breckenridge served as the FASTAB commander at the time of the Beirut Bombing. He witnessed the explosion and was one of the first on the scene afterwards. Jim's work with the foundation is focused on helping to write and tell the military role and history of the Multinational Force from 1982-1984 in Beirut, Lebanon.



Mireille Rebeiz, Ph.D. Associate Professor, Dickinson College

As a citizen of both Lebanon and the United States, Dr. Mireille Rebeiz has a deep understanding of the importance of the Beirut Peacekeepers impact on history. Mireille grew up in Beirut in the 1980's and heard stories of the Marines' role in preserving peace for the people of Lebanon. Her research and desire to share the history of the Multinational Forces impact from 1982-1984 led her to becoming an integral part of developing the educational material for the Beirut Peacekeepers Memorial Tower.

The Moment

On the morning of October 23, 1983, the lives of many were forever changed when two truck bombs exploded in Beirut, Lebanon. These attacks targeted buildings housing members of the Multinational Force, a peacekeeping operation during the Lebanese Civil War, specifically American and French service members.

The devastating blasts resulted in the deaths of 241 U.S. military personnel, 58 French paratroopers, and six civilians.¹ This tragic day marked the most significant loss for the United States Marine Corps since World War II's Battle of Iwo Jima.

The first explosion ripped through the barracks of the 1st Battalion, 8th Marines, claiming 241 American lives including 220 Marines, 18 Navy sailors,


and 3 Army soldiers. Moments later, a second bomb targeted the Drakkar building home to the French military contingent, killing 58, including 55 from the 1st Parachute Chasseur Regiment and three from the 9th Parachute Chasseur Regiment.

This incident stands as the most substantial single-day loss for the French military since the Algerian War ended.

In the aftermath, survivors embarked on a heart-wrenching search through the rubble for their comrades. The impact of this event has had a profound and lasting effect on Marine leadership, leading to significant changes in security measures and the approach to troop deployment.

The Inspiration &



In October of 1983, amidst the backdrop of a turbulent Lebanon, 14-year-old Michael Gaines lost his older brother, William "Bill" R. Gaines Jr., to the devastating Beirut barracks bombing. As with many others impacted by these event, this marked the beginning of Michael's lifelong commitment to honoring the legacy of military veterans and first responders. Motivated by his brother's ultimate sacrifice, Michael enlisted in the military at 17, and years later, helped initiate the development of a memorial park in Charlotte County, Florida. On February 23, 2019, the Charlotte County Commissioners and Administration officially dedicated the formerly known "Sunrise Park" to become the William R. Gaines Jr. Veterans Memorial Park. This space has become more than just a place of remembrance; it is a vibrant community place of gathering, that commemorates the fallen while celebrating life.


The Beirut Peacekeepers Memorial Tower, standing at 45 feet, emerges as a beacon




of honor and remembrance not just for the Beirut peacekeepers, but all veterans and first responders who've sacrificed for our freedom. It aims to provide an interactive experience that educates visitors on the sequence of events leading up to, during and after the Beirut bombing. A part of history that is often forgot and rarely taught in U.S. classrooms.


The tower was designed to achieve three main objectives: pay tribute to the fallen and living heroes, enhance the visiting experience with educational content, and blend seamlessly into the Park's landscape while holding profound historical significance.

This memorial synthesizes the essence of service, valor, and remembrance, making tangible the vigilance and spirit that define our military and first responders. Through this shared space, we commit to ensuring that sacrifices for freedom are forever remembered, understood, and appreciated, merging history with personal stories of courage to inspire future generations to remember and honor our past.









The Design

The Board of Directors alongside the architects involved, led the project with respect and honor of all the lives tragically lost in the Beirut bombing. This included incorporating excerpts from Bill Gaines letters to home and the design team's personal stories to infuse this project with deep personal meaning and historical awareness. The tower's location, within a 40-acre Veterans Memorial Park, was inspired by the Board of Director's

vision and the site's unique features.

The structural design, influenced by the barracks at the bombing site, comprises three elevated levels encased in a concrete exoskeleton. A standout feature is the installation of 241 rods within the tower, representing the lives lost in the bombing. This installation casts patterns of light and shadow, with an oculus above symbolizing a connection between the earthly and the divine, highlighting the ultimate sacrifice of peacekeepers through an interplay of darkness and light.

The Beirut Peacekeepers Memorial Tower is a tribute, standing 45 feet tall in the heart of the park. This three-story structure houses interactive displays that narrate the peacekeepers' involvement in Beirut, from 1982 to 1984, offering visitors a comprehensive timeline of significant events. Designed with a focus on honoring the sacrifices of veterans, first responders, and specifically those lost in the 1983 Beirut bombing, the tower symbolizes a "view of freedom."

At its peak, visitors can appreciate expansive views of the surrounding park, community, and Charlotte Harbor, serving as a poignant reminder of the freedoms protected by the fallen.

The design, conceived by Sweet Sparkman Architecture and Interiors, had to meet three primary challenges to be considered successful:

- Properly commemorate veterans and first responders, particularly those lost in Beirut.
- Enhance the visitor experience at the former Sunrise Park.
- Blend aesthetically into the park while memorializing the military's sacrifices in Beirut thoughtfully.

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The Projects

The Park

The Beirut Peacekeepers Memorial Tower, set within the William R. Gaines Jr. Veterans Memorial Park, underscores the value we place on freedom—a principle profoundly respected in the American ethos. This landmark not only serves as a tribute to those who have laid down their lives for liberty but also educates visitors on the significant role of peacekeeping efforts in Lebanon. By threading through the park and ascending the tower, individuals can immerse themselves in the historical narrative of international peacekeeping efforts, paying respects to the brave souls who endeavored to maintain peace.

The park spans 40 acres, offering a serene peninsula that juts into Charlotte Harbor, and commemorates the sacrifice of veterans and first responders from diverse backgrounds and eras, including those lost in Beirut on October 23, 1983. The summit of the tower presents a breathtaking view, symbolizing the cherished freedoms we have today, and inspires visitors to contemplate how they can contribute to their communities.

Key Features of the Park Include:

- A play area with a military theme beside a pavilion suitable for family gatherings.
- A Splash Pad under development, dedicated to First Responders.
- New ADA-compliant kayak launch for water access, with beautiful views of the bay.
- The notable Liberty Tree, marked by a commemorative freedom stone.
- Memorials honoring Gold Star Families and the sacrifices of fallen soldiers.
- Tributes to the bravery of first responders and the service of all military branches.
- Trails for nature walks and exercise, complete with Health Stations.
- Installment of a flag pole retrieved from Beirut.



The "Classrooms"

Integrating the Lessons of Beirut into Schools:

The foundation's board is in the process of collaborating with local educators to integrate a curriculum on Contemporary American History into K-12 education. This curriculum encompasses the story of the 1983 Beirut bombing and its context within the broader challenges of 21st-century terrorism. With the construction of the Memorial Tower providing a tangible link to these lessons, students will have the opportunity to engage firsthand with survivors' stories and participate in interactive sessions right at the Memorial site.

Plans are underway to introduce virtual reality-based lessons broadening the educational impact to school districts nationwide, enriching students' understanding of historical events and their relevance today.


The Barrier: \$1M

At the raised platforms, integrated with the veil elements, three display panels will present a timeline of events with descriptions and photographs. The Procession: \$35,000

Units Available Name one of the introspective paths leading to the heart of the memorial. These paths, crafted for contemplation and solitude, guide visitors to the core message of the memorial – the enduring legacy of peace.



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Flagpoles: \$25,000

The American flagpole, the tallest, will stand first, followed by the Army and Navy flags. Subsequently, the pole from Beirut with the Marine flag will be spaced out slightly with an area for a plaque. Another space will follow, then the Coast Guard, Air Force, and Space Force flags.

Symbolizing their spirit, 241 polished rods are suspended from the monument center, embodying the fallen and their sacrifice as "Rays of Light." These polished rods suspended from the monument center represent each fallen Peacekeeper. At the tower base, six stones bear the names of Marines killed before the bombing.
